Welcome from the Conference Chair



Dear esteemed colleagues and friends,

It is a great honor to welcome you to the Faculty of Arts at Charles University in Prague for this unique occasion.

As we began preparations for this joint AIS-EAIS event in 2022, the Russian invasion of Ukraine commenced, triggering an unprecedented crisis in Europe. The Czech Republic has since accepted one of the highest numbers of refugees per capita. In October 2023, another globally resonant event occurred: a Hamas terror attack in Israel. This attack reignited Holocaust trauma for Jews both in Israel and worldwide, creating a pervasive sense of peril and insecurity and feelings of abandonment and isolation. The Jewish diaspora arguably now finds itself more connected to Israel than ever before. The traditionally delicate and meticulously defined boundaries between Israel and its diasporas have become less distinct. Also, externally, Jews are increasingly perceived interchangeably with Israelis, leading to an association of accountability for the actions and policies of the State of Israel. This phenomenon, which echoes the historical reality of Jews in Central-Eastern Europe under communist regimes, is now resurfacing with worldwide significance.

Simultaneously, the Arab world has experienced a collective sense of mourning and outrage in response to the humanitarian crisis emerging from the Gaza Strip. The Israeli-Palestinian conflict continues to manifest through global interplay while Jewish and Muslim communities have experienced dynamic transformations that, in their magnitude, parallel the vigor typically associated with a paradigm shift. Both antisemitism and anti-Muslim hatred have reached critical levels.

Those inevitably affected by the unfolding events include liberal activists, scholars, and public intellectuals from Muslim and Jewish backgrounds who have dedicated much of their lives to embodying the foundational principles of shared societies. Their efforts aimed at humanizing the "Other," fostering a platform for mutual acknowledgment of narratives, and exploring possibilities for reconciliation have been compromised and, in many instances, perceived as futile.

Our conference in Prague endeavors to provide a space for a plurality of scholarships and reinforce an environment of mutual respect, inspiration, and encouragement. With over 550 active participants and more than 160 panels, this gathering aspires to be the largest conference on Israel Studies to date.

To conclude, I would like to express my highest appreciation to the leadership of the Faculty of Arts at Charles University for hosting our conference during these turbulent times. This conference could not have happened without the stable and sophisticated leadership of EAIS-AIS presidents Raphael Cohen-Almagor and Artur Skorek, board and academic council members, including the unflagging participation of nearly sixty members of the Program Committee. To name at least three of those whose enthusiastic engagement went far beyond their honorable duties: Joanna Dyduch, Olaf Gloeckner, and Timea Crofony.

Special thanks are due to those who tirelessly worked to make this event possible: the one and only Anina Selve, the AIS conference coordinator; the extraordinary Eliska Horakova, the C-IN Agency manager, and her team; Katerina Krejcirova, the EAIS coordinator; and Stephanie Colley, assistant to the executive AIS director.

Venue

Charles University was founded in 1348 and is one of the world's oldest universities. The largest and most famous Czech university, it also ranks highest among Czech schools in international rankings. It is the only Czech university ranking among the world's top 250 universities.

The modern, dynamic and cosmopolitan university has 17 faculties (14 in Prague, two in Hradec Králové and one in Pilsen), four university institutes, five other centres for educational, scientific, research, development and other creative activities, four university-wide special-purpose facilities and the Rector's Office as the executive management unit of the Charles University. It currently has more than 950 accredited study programmes. A number of study programmes are accredited in English. Charles University has nearly 50 000 students roughly a sixth of all students in the Czech Republic enrolled in more than 300 accredited degree programs that offer over 630 different courses. More than 20,000 students are studying in Bachelor's degree programs, almost 25,000 in Master's programs, and 8,000 in Ph.D. programs. The University has over 7,000 students from other countries. Every year, just under 9,000 students complete their studies; Charles University graduates enjoy one of the highest employment rates of any population segment in the Czech Republic. Every year a diverse range of lifelong learning courses are attended by more than 16,000 participants.

Charles University has a number of top research teams that collaborate with foreign institutions. Students at individual faculties also have the opportunity to participate in the scientific and research activities of the University. CU staff participate in international projects, such as the European Organization for Nuclear Research (CERN) programme or prestigious ERC grants. The e-book Ninety-nine steps into the Future of CU shows university projects that were funded by the Operational Programme Research, Development and Education (OP Research, Development and Education) in 2014–2023. The area of international cooperation has a significant role in raising the international profile of the university and its openness. The university strives to achieve high standards in joint international scientific projects, is active in a number of prestigious international organisations and university networks and actively supports international mobility of students and academic staff.

Charles University cooperates with a number of renowned universities around the world and its priority is to enable all students to go on study stays or practical internships abroad. The most important exchange programme, Erasmus +, is used by around two thousand students a year.

The university places great emphasis on the development of inter-university cooperation, to which institutions are bound by bilateral agreements. Currently, this network includes nearly 200 partner universities from all continents. CU's partners are prestigious universities from all over the world. Cooperation with partner universities takes place in a wide range of areas, from joint research projects to the organisation of conferences, seminars and summer schools.

The university is a member of university organisations, in particular the 4EU+ European University Alliance and the Coimbra Group. It chairs the Association of Central European Universities (CE7) and is part of the collaboration between the League of European Research Universities (LERU) and CE7. CU is also part of the Eastern Partnership University Cluster (EaPUC), which brings together leading EU universities and the best universities from the Eastern Partnership countries.

The Faculty of Arts at Charles University

is a preeminent institution in the realm of arts and humanities in Central Europe, epitomizing excellence in both research and education.

The Faculty of Arts was founded as one the four original faculties of Charles University - the oldest institution of higher learning in Central Europe by the issue of the Foundation Charter on 7 April 1348. Charles IV, in pursuit of his state and dynastic policy, strove to establish the Kingdom of Bohemia as the centre of the Holy Roman Empire. His plan was to concentrate scholars from home and abroad in Prague, which became his residential city, and thus bolster the base of his power. In pre-Hussite times, two-thirds of all students of the university were students of the Artistic Faculty where they acquired the knowledge needed to be able to study at the other three faculties (theology, medicine, law). One of the privileges enjoyed by the faculty was the right to confer master's and doctoral degrees which entitled their bearers to teach at any European university. During the two centuries following the Hussite wars, the Faculty of Liberal Arts was the heart of the whole university. Since the seventeenth century it was called the Philosophical Faculty. From the beginning until the mid-nineteenth century, it served as a faculty whose programme was designed to provide preparatory higher education for the future students of the other faculties. From the eighteenth century onwards, the number of academic disciplines started to increase: besides philosophy, it was possible to study aesthetics, mathematics, astronomy, natural sciences, engineering, economics, education and history. In the nineteenth century, apart from oriental studies, archaeology and religious studies, significant developments took place in the realm of philology and degrees in Czech, Italian, French, English and Hebrew were introduced. After the reforms of 1849-1850, the faculty was liberated from its propaedeutic function and acquired an equal with the other faculties. In 1897, women were allowed to study at the Philosophical Faculty. Jan Hus, Bernard Bolzano, Tomáš Garrigue Masaryk, Jaroslav Goll, Jan Mukařovský, Bedřich Hrozný, Josef Pekař, Jan Patočka

and Václav Černý are some of the most important personalities connected with the faculty. The Faculty retained its significance in the Czech lands even after the division of the Prague University into a Czech part and a German part in 1882. During the so-called First Czechoslovak Republic (1918–1938), the life of the university was shaped especially by the secession of the Faculty of Natural Sciences in 1920 and by the acquisition of a new building on the Vltava embankment – the one where you still find most of the departments and lecture halls. The closure of the Faculty by the Nazi occupation in 1939 was followed by brutal persecution of both teachers and students.

After the liberation of Czechoslovakia in 1945, the faculty enjoyed several fruitful years. The productive, enthusiastic years after the end of the Second World War came to a violent end in 1948 with the communist coup d' état and the following forty years of communist regime. As many excellent academics were forced to leave and meaningless subjects on Marxist-Leninist philosophy were introduced, the faculty was rapidly losing its prestige. The art historian and archaeologist Růžena Vacková (1901–1982) was not allowed to lecture the Faculty since 1950. In 1952, she was arrested and sentenced to imprisonment of twenty-two years in a fake political process with Catholic intellectuals. Hopes for a widespread social change in the late 1960s, the so-called "Prague Spring" during which the Faculty started to invite back significant personalities of that time, such as the philosopher Jan Patočka, were crushed by the Soviet invasion in August 1968. In January 1969, Jan Palach, a student of the Faculty, committed suicide by self-immolation in political protest. He doused himself in petrol and set himself alight in Wenceslas Square on 16 January 1969. He died of his injuries three days later. His funeral turned into a major protest against the occupation. The square where the main building is located and the Faculty of Arts central library bear his name. In 1970s, Professor Patočka became involved in the creation of Charta 77 and together with Jiří Hájek and Václav Havel was one of its first speakers. He died in hospital after a demanding interrogation by the communist police over his involvement with Charta in 1977

Only after the fall of the communist regime and the departure of its compromised representatives in 1989, the faculty could again established itself as one of the most prestigious institutions in the Czech Republic. Thanks to almost seven hundred years of history, its successful research and teaching activities, and the wide range of study programmes, the Faculty of Arts, Charles University enjoys the position of great authority in the Czech society, and excellent international reputation. *Sources: https://cuni.cz/UKEN-696.html https://www.ff.cuni.cz/home/faculty/structure-history/ history-faculty/*

Call for Papers

Considering the gravity of the recent events and their ongoing or imminent repercussions, we have expanded this Call for Papers to reflect the present situation. Therefore, apart from the given topic, we appreciate all proposals focused on any aspect and perspective of current affairs triggered on October 7.

The conference's conveners will work tirelessly to create a safe space where diverse scholarships will be included and respected.

By this CfP we announce the first joint AIS EAIS conference, marking the 12th Annual Conference of the European Association of Israel Studies and 40th Annual Meeting of the Association for Israel Studies. This event will bring together distinguished scholars, researchers, and experts from around the world to explore the rich and diverse landscape of Israel Studies.

The late Czech French writer Milan Kundera famously expressed his perception of the complex European Israeli attachment in 1985 while accepting the Jerusalem Prize: "Even after Europe so tragically failed them, the Jews nonetheless kept faith with that European cosmopolitanism; and Israel, their little homeland finally regained, seems to me the true heart of Europe a heart strangely located outside the body."

How have European and international discourses and understanding of Israel developed over the last decades? Is the European perspective on Israel considered unique, loaded by often unprocessed events of the 20th century, or can we no longer distinguish rel evant geographical patterns in today's globalized world? How do Israel and its society differ or mirror Kundera's nostalgic optics, and what are the current principal challenges? In the contemporary landscape, where does Israel stand in relation to both Europe and the Middle East?

The conference aims to bring together international scholars, post docs, and PhD students from any discipline relevant to Israel Studies including, but not limited to, Anthropology, Arts (music, visual, performance, film, etc.), Culture Studies, Conflict Resolution, Disability Studies, Economics and Business, Education, Gender Studies, Geography and Environment, History, International Relations, Jewish Studies, Language and Literature, Law, Media and Communication, Middle East Studies, Migration Studies, Minority Studies, Palestine Studies, Philosophy and Thought, Politics, Religious Studies, Security Studies, and Sociology.
